
Finally we journey to the Forbidden City in Pekin (now Beijing) to see a small selection of what



The DUKW was an amphibious version of the GMC 2 1/2 ton cargo truck.

Developed for the US Army during WWII it was to ferry cargo from ships at sea directly on to the shore.

Postwar the DUKW continued to give sterling service to the armed forces and was also used extensively by civilian operators around the world.

Our K&C model, aptly named "Donald", comes complete with a mixed removable cargo load of Jerricans and 50 gallon oil drums - all lashed down. In addition the vehicle driver and a supervising US Beachmaster provide the human dimension to the set.

INCE THE DAWN of history, kings, emperors and rulers have
raised elite corps of soldiers to provide bodyguards of
unswerving loyalty to them and only them.

Napoleon Bonaparte's Guard regiments were the ultimate symbol of his leadership. Unable to adopt the title of King because of the very revolution which he had taken over, France's "First Consul" and future Emperor nonetheless created what, at the time, was the finest Guard corps in the world.

The Guard's first commander, Joachim Murat proclaimed Napoleon's vision: "The First Consul intends that the Guard shall be a perfect model for the rest of the Army".

Admission to this elite was to be restricted to soldiers who had already performed heroic deeds ... been wounded on campaign and have provided proof of their bravery, discipline, patriotism and good conduct over a number of years.

Physically these men had to be no less than 25 years of age and stand 5ft 9ins to 6ft tall and, obviously, in robust good health.

Finally they had to be literate and have participated in at least 3 campaigns during the Wars of Liberation.

Successful applicants would enjoy higher pay, better barracks and rations as well as splendid uniforms and a host of other privileges. As an additional bonus all ranks in "The Guard" counted as higher than their equivalent in normal 'Line' regiments. Line regiments were, in fact, ordered to salute and present arms whenever a unit of 'The Guard' passed by!

THE 'IMPERIAL GUARD'

With Napoleon's self-coronation as Emperor in 1804 the Guard's title was established as 'La Garde Imperiale' and their military standing even more enhanced as a result.

Napoleon himself demonstrated a close, intense interest in all aspects of his 'Guards' welfare and conditions of service. From special awards for conspicuous gallantry to the most mundane matters of rations he would attend to personally.

He pardoned, even occasionally condoned an easy familiarity with his old 'Grumblers' - 'Les Grognards' in French.

This extreme devotion was returned with interest by his *Guards* - unbounded loyalty ... high morale ... fierce discipline and courage unto death.

HORSE ARTILLERY IN ACTION

As a former gunner himself Napoleon knew only too well the value of artillery in a battle. In 1806 he formed a regiment of *Horse Artillery of the Guard* composed of 3 squadrons each with two batteries of 6 guns.

Our latest release shows a 12 Pound 'Gribeval' cannon with 3 gunners. An additional Horse Artillery Officer with telescope is also available. Meanwhile a mounted Horse Artillery Officer shouts encouragement. These latest Napoleonic additions add even more colour and drama to this important series.

"VIVE L'IMPERATRICE!"

An added bonus to this month's releases are the 4 new Empress' Dragoon figures. These all-action mounted pieces have been completely redesigned and resculpted to replace four of the original Dragoons retired earlier this year.

The CORPS of GRENADIERS

The regiment of the Grenadier Guards was created on 2nd December 1799 and disbanded on 11th September 1815.

On 15th April 1806, the second regiment was created and joined to the first in 1809. On 13th September 1810, the grenadiers from the Royal Dutch Guards became the second regiment of the Grenadier Guards. On the 18th May 1811, this regiment became the third when the second was re-formed. This third, called the "Dutch" was disbanded on 15th February 1815.

Like the first, the second was disbanded on 11th September 1815. A short-lived third regiment of foot grenadiers was created on 8th April 1815 only to be disbanded on the 24th September.

The battalion of Velites (Grenadiers), attached to the grenadier regiment and having the responsibility of training its future cadres,

was set up on 29th July 1804; its fate was that of the regiment.

A company of veterans was set up on 12th July 1801 and continued to exist after the

fall of the Empire.



Y CHRISTMAS DAY 1944, the Germans had punched a massive bulge in the Allied lines, creating a salient that forever after would be known simply as 'The Bulge'.

With St. Vith taken and Bastogne besieged it seemed as if Hitler's final 'throw of the dice' had indeed, paid off! However the small Belgian town of Celles was to be the high watermark of the German western advance.

Now with the enemy lines extended the Allies began the long, slow difficult job of squeezing the 'Bulge' from top and bottom - Patton from the South ... Montgomery from the North.

K&C 'WINTER' GERMANS

Our latest seven releases, due to be available this September show the battle from the German side. Back in December 2004 and January 2005 when we launched our original American 'Battle of the Bulge' sets it was always our intention to bring out additional 'winter' sets of Germans to provide the opposition. Now here they are ... two brand-new tracked models plus four sets of figures and a superb 'personality' piece.

BBG01 is the 'GRILLE' - a self propelled artillery piece mounted on the chassis of the ever-reliable Czech 38T Tank much favoured by the Germans. Our model has a 10.5cm howitzer and is painted in an authentic winter whitewashed camouflage finish. Two well-wrapped up crew figures add extra realism to the set.

BBG02 'WINTER PATROL' shows a mixed group of Volksgrenadiers and Waffen SS in 'snow' camouflage smocks and tunics carefully moving forward well supplied with ammunition and extra grenades.



BBG03 'WINTER TANK RIDERS'

For some fortunate troopers a ride to the front was provided by passing armoured vehicles. Four Waffen SS men

perch themselves on one of our

King Tigers.

BBG04 "GI PRISONERS"

Most, but not all, American prisoners who fell into German hands were treated humanely.

This set shows 3 such GI's with

their Volksgrenadier captor. For them their war is over. BBG05 THE 'HETZER' TANK

Another German Self-Propelled Gun mounted on the 38T chassis. Camouflaged in the distinctive 'ambush' pattern style our little 'Hetzer' comes with a radio operator, a standing vehicle commander plus a very nifty road sign.

BBG06 'CROSSING THE ROAD'
This set is based on two very famous photos taken by German war photographers during the battle. A lying prone SS man gestures to 2 of his comrades to run across a road ... a fourth trooper guards their rear. Out of interest one of the SS troopers is smoking a 'liberated' American cigarette and carrying a captured MI Carbine!

BBG07 'SEPP' DIETRICH The commander of 6th Panzer Army and onetime C.O. of both the Leibstandarte Adolf Hitler regiment and division. Here Dietrich wears a warm sheepskin jacket over his normal field gray service uniform. The figure's stance is typical 'Sepp' Dietrich.

'WACHT AM RHEIN'

'WATCH ON THE RHINE' was the operational code name for this major attack in the west. Three Armies... the 6th Panzer Army under 'Sepp' Dietrich... the 5th Panzer Army of Hugo Van Manteuffel and the 7th Army led by General Erich Brandenberger provided the vast bulk of the attacking force - 275,000 men ... 1900 heavy artillery pieces and almost a thousand armoured vehicles were the 'mailed fist' that would punch through



and pulverize the Allied Line. The scene was set for one of the epic battles of World War Two.

COMING IN NOVEMBER

Later this year (November) additional sets of American 'Battle of the Bulge' themed figures and fighting vehicles will be available. Look out for more GI's in action as well as a 'wolf in sheep's clothing' surprise.

THROUGH THE GAP

The situation was most threatening for the Allies in the Losheim Gap. There Dietrich, hoping to exploit a route along the Ambleve valley towards the Meuse, concentrated his tank assault. His spearhead was Kampfgruppe (Task Force)

SEPP DIETRICH - 'CUNNING, ENERGETIC AND BRUTAL'

itler described Josef 'Sepp' Dietrich (1892-1966) as 'simultaneously cunning, energetic and brutal' - characteristics that made him an ideal lieutenant for the Führer.

Dietrich, a Munich policeman, joined the Nazi party in 1928. In 1933 he created a special SS bodyguard - the Leibstandarte Adolf Hitler to protect the Führer and other Nazi leaders, and he took an active part in the 'Night of the Long Knives' in 1934. By the outbreak of war his group had been transformed into an elite military unit, becoming a full division in 1941. Dietrich led it in France in 1940, on the Eastern Front in 1941-3 and in Normandy in 1944.

He was put in charge of Sixth Panzer Army for the Battle of the Ardennes and commanded it

- despite his failure to break through to the Meuse - until the end of the war, fighting in Hungary and Austria. He was one of only 27 men to be awarded Diamonds to his Knight's Cross. After the war he was tried for war crimes mainly connected with the massacre at Malmedy, although he took no active part in it and received a life sentence. He was paroled in 1955.

Peiper - 110 tanks and 4000 men from the elite 1st SS Panzer

Division 'Leibstandarte Adolf Hitler'.

SS Colonel Jochen Peiper, a ruthless 29-year-old veteran of the Eastern Front, was a proven tank commander, but he ran into problems from the start. Because of the need for secrecy, he had been

unable to conduct a

preliminary reconnaissance. He had to advance, in the depths of winter, along roads that he described as fit 'not for tanks but for bicycles' and with precarious supply lines. Surprise was his only asset.

Peiper approached the battle area early on December 16, expecting the



infantry to have cleared the way. But an unrepaired railway bridge, created a huge traffic jam, and dogged American resistance threw him hopelessly behind schedule. That night, when his panzers should have been racing for the Meuse, they were stuck in Lanzerath, a few kilometres from his start line.

There was better news for Peiper the next day: the 14th Cavalry Group had fallen back. But once more he was held

up - first by a temporary shortage of fuel, then when he was forced to make a detour for fear of becoming bogged down along the direct crosscountry route towards the Meuse. Finally, Peiper skirted Malmedy - where at about 2 pm occurred one of the worst atrocities of the northwest Europe campaign - and achieved his breakthrough. Nothing now seemed to stand between him and the Meuse.

He was stopped not by massively superior forces, but by small groups of American combat engineers. As Peiper approached Stavelot - a small village containing a vital bridge across the Ambleve - late on the 17th, a force of only 13 men from Company C, 291st Combat Engineer Battalion, disabled his leading Panther with a lucky bazooka shot, effectively blocking the road. By now it was pitch dark and Peiper, unsure of the scale of the American defence, delayed his assault on Stavelot until the following morning.

In the event, he captured the village

three bridges across the Ambleve and Salm rivers at Trois Ponts, a few kilometres farther west. As Kampfgruppe Peiper approached Trois Ponts a few hours later, the bridges were blown, forcing Peiper to move north onto minor roads to search for alternative crossing points. His King Tiger tanks were once again running short of fuel and, despite the discovery of an intact bridge at Cheneux just beyond the village of La Gleize, the




advance was halted when a sudden break in the weather allowed Allied fighter-bombers to attack. They destroyed only one Tiger, but this blocked the bridge long enough for US engineers to destroy the only other bridge Peiper could use.

For six days Peiper fought for survival as the Americans concentrated their forces against him. Cut off, surrounded and short of supplies, the remains of Peiper's task force formed a defensive ring around La Gleize. By Christmas Eve, Peiper had no choice but to

order his men to escape as
