ENEMIES OF ROME.

n Ancient Rome BARBARIAN was a term of abuse. An insult. The Romans used it to describe all those living outside its imperial borders. These Barbarians were seen as wild savages to be subdued at best and feared at worst... The very term "barbarian" is derived from the Latin word for beard or unshaven... "barba".

Even today our image of the ancient Celts... Britons... Gauls...and Huns is heavily influenced by the word pictures drawn by ancient Roman historians.

These Barbarians are viewed as the very antithesis of Roman civilization... 'Destroyers'. The nightmare

vision usually portrayed shows an anarchic, savage warrior society hellbent on rape... pillage... and terror!

The real picture which has emerged in recent times shows that many of these ancient tribal societies had just as many "codes" of honour and behaviour" as the Romans did. They also had very structured hierarchies and ways of life that they felt were being usurped and threatened by

the never ending encroachment of Rome and her

legions. Many of the conquered peoples of the known world at that time were content to bend the knee and bow the head to the power

BAR001 "A Mounted Chieftain" who bears more than a passing resemblance to Sean Connery - perhaps he is a distant Celtic relative. This mounted warrior carries the traditional flowing dragon snake banner and has decorated his horse with several severed heads!

BAR002 "Attacking with Axe". A running tribesman shield in one hand... long cruel axe held aloft and ready to strike a fatal blow.

BAR003 "Attacking with Sword and Shield". Posed ready for battle and looking for a victim.

BAR004 "Fighting Chief". Wearing a captured Roman Auxiliary's chain mail vest this Gallic Chieftain has already dispatched at least one of his Roman enemies.

BAR005 "Charge!". This warrior rushes forward, his long lance at the ready.

BAR006 "Gruesome Trophies". Another tribesman attacks - his shield and



banner adorned with the heads of his fallen

BAR007 "Slashing Warrior". About to strike a blow this Hun warrior has a captured Roman dagger on

BAR008 "Running Warrior". With sword and shield vet another warrior rushes into the

attack BAR009 "Wolfshead". Over his captured Roman helmet this German warrior has draped his wolf pelt complete with wolfshead.

BAR010 "Hacking Warrior". With his richly decorated shield and colourful helmet, this particular tribesman makes a striking impression.

BRITAIN Versus THE ROMANS

Ancient Britain was

the final Celtic bastion to fall to the Roman conquerors. An expeditionary campaign by Caesar was followed by a more thorough invasion by the Emperor Claudius in 43 AD. Just as with Gaul, it was the struggles between the Celtic tribes that proved the excuse for Roman intervention and the to dominate Britain by understanding this

nd incorporating friendly tribal heads as their allies. Occupation was far from an easy ride. It is true that many Celtic warlords welcomed the peace and prosperity brought by the Romans, but others resented it and two revolts shook the pretensions of the Roman governors. Oueen Boudicca's revolt in the south of England is the best known of these and the

most violent The Britons fought much as the Celts of France did. with one major exception. They appear to have retained

the use of the chariot long after it disappears in continental warfare. Caesar was especially impressed by their use in battle: "The chariots of the Britons begin the fighting by charging over the battlefield. From them they hurl javelins, although the noise of the wheels and chariot teams are enough to throw any enemy into panic. The charioteers are very skilled. They can drive their teams down very steep slopes without losing control. Some warriors can run along the chariot vole, stand on the voke and then dart back into the chariot." Roman historian Tacitus describes a battle against the German auxiliaries employed by the

he wrote, "the Britons showing both steadiness and skill in parrying our javelins with their huge swords or catching them on their little shields while they themselves rained volleys on us." But when the Britons clash with the German auxiliaries, it is a different story. "These old soldiers (the Germans) had been well drilled in sword-fighting, while

Romans. "The fighting began

with exchanges of missiles,"

the enemy were awkward at it. with their small shields and unwieldy swords. especially as the

later had no points and were quite unsuitable for cut and thrust at close auarters." Beyond the Celts of

northern England lived another kind of barbarian people - the Picts. These are generally regarded as non-

Celtic tribesmen, perhaps related to the original inhabitants of Britain who were themselves displaced by invading waves of Celts. There is little evidence of this, however, and they may well just have been a Caledonii. From the evidence of other countries invaded by superior cultures, it is more than likely that the conquering Celts annihilated all the indigenous peoples, hunting them down as Westerners did in North America or Australia. The Picts' Latin name was inspired by the practice of covering their bodies in tattoos and they do appear to have devised a form of warfare different to that south of Hadrian's Wall. In this, long spears

were used in a form of phalanx incorporating other warriors armed with swords and shields. The use of long spears or pikes is distinct to this part of Britain and appears later in Scottish warfare in the Middle Ages

where a pike formation is known as the schiltron



WARRIORS & WEAPONS





LIT OF THE CLEAR blue desert skies the Stukas descended like vultures on the long khaki line of withdrawing British vehicles Rombs detached themselves from the bellies and wings of the German divelombers and after an all-too-short interval exploded with deadly accuracy along the length of the British column. On the ground the soldiers made a feeble attempt with rifles and machine guns to ward off the enemy attack

As quickly as the assault began it ended... one by one the Stukas departed. Pillars of

With the Italians retreating in Libya, Hitler needed an outstanding general to reverse the fortunes of war back in the Axis favour. In Erwin Rommel, soon to be nicknamed The Desert Fox', he found his man...

had complete operational command and answered only to Hitler in Berlin. Rommel's initial orders were for him to recapture only the eastern past of Libva which the British had so dramatically taken at the beginning of 1941.

"EXPECT THE UNEXPECTED!"

Making unpredictable moves came naturally to Erwin Rommel. On March 24, just weeks after arriving, he launched his first bold assault with his own German 5th Light Division supported by Italian motorized infantry. Dividing his troops into three 'pincers' he sent one to capture the coastal town of El Agheila and then to pursue the retreating British through Benghazi and on to Barce

and Derno

taken Bardia four days later Sollum, he bypassed Tobruk to push forward to Egypt and the Suez Canal.

It seemed as if nothing and no one could halt this relentless advance. Only Tobruk, now behind the German frontline, held out. There, men of the 9th Australian Division under the strong command of General Leslie Morshead dug in and made every shell and bullet count. As Marshead said at the time, "There will be no Dunkirk here!" He went on. "if we get out we'll fight our way out... there will be no surrender and no retreat".

ONLY THE FIRST BATTLE ...

Over the next two years Rommel and his Afrika Korus (made up of German and Italians) fought countless battles large

now stretched along the desert coastal road... It was April 1, 1941 - "April Fools The British had been fooled - and not

for the last time - by the man who came to be known as 'The Desert Fox Lt. General Erwin Rommel, in

command of the newly created Deutsches Afrika Korps, had been ordered to begin his counter offensive against the British only when all his forces were up to full strength. The impulsive and daring Rommel

decided to sieze the initiative with a surprise blow on the already overstretched British, and it succeeded brilliantly!!

Rommel had arrived in North Africa a scant few months before and came under the nominal control of General Garibaldi, the Italian C in C for that Theatre of Operations. In reality however he

Today, more than 60 years after the Desert campaign, the few remaining Afrika Korps veterans are still warmly welcomed as honoured guests at the gatherings of the dwindling band of elderly Eighth Army soldiers. King & Country, with this latest

Revolutionary Marines & Others

THE UNITED STATES MARINE CORPS is older than the Republic itself by a year. It's as familiar to most Americans as the Stars 'n' Stripes. The Marines have come to symbolize, more than any other part of the US Armed Forces, discipline... valour...patriotism and military virtue.

Their characteristics distinguish them from rest of the American military, provoking a mixture of emotions that encompass reverence... envy... and disdain. These are shared by all military elites since the time of ancient Rome.

The Marines are, as they claim, looking for a few good men - and it has ever been thus...

EARLY BEGINNINGS

The United States Marine Corps was created on 10 November 1775 when the Continental Congress passed a resolution to raise 'two Battalions of Marines' for service on board ship. Serving on land and sea, these Continental Marines well acquitted themselves in a number of operations including the first amphibious raid on the Bahamas as well as another on mainland Britain during the Revolutionary War.

These operations were under the command of a Captain Samuel Nicholas, later promoted to Major, who is considered to be the Corps' first Commandant.

For their uniforms these early Marines were garbed in green coats with white facings. They were not specifically designed for the Marines... they came from stocks of pre-war uniforms originally

intended for a volunteer Company of Philadelphia Militia. Not for the first - or the last time would the Marines be provided for with the

These first green clad



Marines were, at the end of the American War of Independence in 1783, disbanded only to be reformed in 1798.

"BROWN BESS"

The standard weapon of the British infrantryman was the smoothbore flintlock musket, known as "Brown Bess", which had been in use since 1717. Its weight 6 &b (14 Hi but had been of when 100 cm on

had a barrel either 106 cm or 117 cm long (42 in. or 46 in.), and fired a round lead

ball weighing roughly an ounce, made up, with its charge of powder, into a stoot paper carriage. With its sporting stock, well-shaped bross farniture and lock wohich had the reputation of misfiring less often than any military firearm, it was eminently suited to the close-order, shortrange, colleg frime of the day.

Although twelve separate motions were required to prime and load flintlock muskets, a well-trained soldier could load and fire five times a minute. Nevertheless this type of weapon had one very serious drawback; its efficiency was largely devendent on the weather. A high wide

drawback; its efficiency was largely dependent on the weather. A high wind might might blow the priming out of the pan, or a rainstorm might wash it out, or dampen it so that it would

not ignite.



Perhaps because of this unreliability officers trained in the school of European battle placed extra reliance on the bayonet. For this reason British Redcoats preferred to fire a volley and

CF008 A non commissioned officer of the 13th SS Mountain Division "Handschar". This unit, made up of Bosnian Muslims, was formed in Yugoslavia in 1942 to fight against Tito and his partisans.

Although the Division wore regular German uniforms they were distinguished by their headgear -- the traditional Moslem "Fez" either in field gray or maroon red. In addition on their left sleeve, under the SS eagle, they wore a

cloth arm shield adorned with the Bosnian red and white checker board pattern. This NCO is armed with an MP40

Schmeisser machine pistol. Please note: These two "exclusives"
